As you may have noticed, we are no longer advertising "The Bodyguard" at the Pantages Theatre. I called them the first day tickets were available and found that the only tickets left were either up the 44 steps to the balcony or in the very back two rows of the Orchestra (which the representative told me were the worst seats in the theater and were expensive). I am hoping that "Hamilton," which will be at the Pantages for months, will have some decent seats by October or November. It isn't on sale yet, but the sales representative at the Pantages told me it would be expensive. <u>There is a sign-up</u> <u>sheet at the office to indicate if you would like to go, even if the ticket price is \$200 or more plus the</u> cost of the bus and lunch!

We also had to cancel <u>four trips</u>! The "Price is Right Live" sold very poorly, and we canceled so we didn't have to pay for the bus. Cal Poly took the tickets back and exchanged them for 26 tickets to "Pippin" on Friday, June 2! The beer trip had little interest. "Finding Neverland" hadn't sold enough tickets to even consider paying the final payment which was due. And the San Francisco trip I had spent so many hours planning and booking hadn't sold nearly enough to make the trip possible. I am very unhappy about this, but we can't continue to have trips that don't fill the bus sufficiently to cover our costs! As a result, we don't have any trips for March and only one for April so far. We will be discussing more trips at our January Committee Meeting, but the deadline for this newsletter was January 16th, so I won't have any updates until late in the month. Watch the bulletin board in the hall for more upcoming trips, probably closer to home and on smaller buses.


